Arizona seminar set

How to sell what they don't

How to sell what they don't own — and still legally get paid for it — is the goal of Avis Culbert and Janis Hertsberg, partners in Accent Arizona Advisors, a business specializing in guided tours of the state.

For eight years, the two friends have been conducting tours of Atizons from the Grand Canyon to the Mexican border and everything in between. They've explained the flora and faura, even down to the rattlesnakes and cactus and how the ancient Indians used the various species in their diets.

Now demand for certified guides has increased to such a degree that the pair will conduct a series of seminars to interest and train men and women as tour directors in Arizons.

There will be nine hours of classroom instruction and 37 hours of field training. Lectures will be at 9109 N. Central and field trips will originate at resorts around the Valley.

Cost for the seminar is \$350, which includes all printed materials, admissions and the motor coach used for field trips.

Culbert, a longtime Scottsdale resident and the first queen of Scottsdale's Parada del Sol, has been active in the Phoenix Art Museum, Phoenix Zoo, and has been conducting educational tours for many years. Hertzberg became a tour guide after she and her husband went on an Arizona tour.
